### Research Base for Guided Reading as an Instructional Approach

Considerable research evidence supports the provision of explicit instruction for students at risk for reading difficulties; however, one of the most widely implemented approaches to early reading instruction is Guided Reading (GR; Fountas & Pinnel, 1996), which deemphasizes explicit instruction and practice of reading skills in favor of extended time reading text. This study evaluated the two approaches in the context of supplemental intervention for at-risk readers at the end of Grade 1.

Guided reading is informed by Vygotsky's (1978) Zone of Proximal Development and Bruner's (1986) notion of scaffolding, informed by Vygotsky's research. The practice of guided reading is based on the belief that the optimal learning for a reader occurs when they are assisted by an educator, or expert "other", to read and understand a text with clear but limited guidance.

Research Basis. Guided reading is subject to many interpretations, but Burkins & Croft (2010) identify these common elements: Working with small groups. Matching student reading ability to text levels. Giving everyone in the group the same text. Introducing the text.
